The majority of charges go through SmartFlow and then appear on the patient's invoice. Items in SmartFlow must be checked off/initialed once completed. If you have questions on how to properly enter something into SmartFlow, please email Brandy or ask another team member.

Important notes:

- Hospitalization is now being charged real time, meaning it begins the moment the patient is admitted. This must be checked off in SmartFlow by the Vet Admins.
- If you are working with a doctor and they want to do an ultrasound quick scan, enter it in SmartFlow so it bills to the invoice.

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MEDICAL SPOTLIGHT: LEPTOSPIROSIS

Leptospirosis is a zoonotic bacterial infection of the spirochete *Leptospira* spp. More than 250 strains of *Leptospira* exist worldwide. It commonly infects dogs and other mammals including rats, horses, cattle, pigs, goats, and sheep. Cats can be infected, but symptoms tend to be mild (some renal and hepatic inflammation) and not much is known about their excretion of *Leptospira* into the environment.

Transmission of the bacteria occurs through (a) direct contact with urine or other bodily fluids (excluding saliva) of infected animals, or (b) contact with environmental elements contaminated with infected urine, such as water, soil, or food. Infected animals can excrete the bacteria continuously or intermittently for months to years. In warm areas, it can survive in fresh water or damp soil for weeks to months! Bacteria infects a host (human or animal) via the mucous membranes (of the eyes, nose, or mouth), by drinking contaminated water, or through cuts or scratches in the skin. In animals, shared bedding, bites, consumption of contaminated carcasses, breeding, and placental transmission have been documented as well.

Worldwide, more than a million people are infected annually, with approximately 60,000 dying from leptospirosis each year. The incubation period is typically 5-14 days, but can range from 2-30 days. The first, acute stage of infection typically occurs within a week of infection and presents with flu-like symptoms (fever, chills, muscle aches, vomiting, diarrhea) which are often self-limiting. Approximately 90% of documented cases fall in this category. During this phase, the bacteria circulates and replicates in the bloodstream before migrating into the organs. A small percentage of individuals have a recurrence of symptoms several days later called the anicteric immune phase. Aseptic meningitis can occur during this phase. Most people fully recover from this, but may have recurrent headaches.

Approximately 10% of infected people instead develop an icteric stage of leptospirosis, or Weil's Disease. This is a much more severe infection, with symptoms including renal failure, liver failure, hemorrhage, respiratory distress, and even death.



The heart, central nervous system, and muscles can be affected. Uveitis may also occur. Weil's can affect an individual for weeks to months. The overall mortality rate of leptospirosis manifesting as Weil's is 5-15%, but can reach up to 50-60% for those with pulmonary hemorrhage.

For dogs, vaccination is important for prevention, particularly in higher risk pets. There is currently no vaccine for humans available in the U.S. for leptospirosis - attempts to create one have not had much clinical success.

Instead, prevention can be achieved using proper precautions and appropriate cleaning and handling techniques.

Practice good hand hygiene through thorough and frequent hand washing. Gloves should be worn whenever handling infected or potentially infected patients, as well as anything they were in contact with (food/water bowls, bedding, toys) that may be soiled. Wear a gown to reduce any bacterial contamination of clothing which could potentially infect other people or patients. When there is the possibility of aerosolization (during surgery, or post-mortem care), a face shield or mask and goggles should be worn to protect from infection via the facial mucous membranes.

Luckily, in terms of cleaning, *Leptospira* is easily killed. Normal laundering is effective for cleaning contaminated items and bedding. Most detergents, disinfectants, and soaps work well against the bacteria. Alcohol-based gels and antibacterial wipes are also effective. Recommendations for cleaning cages and surfaces include a 1:10 solution of bleach (1 part bleach + 10 parts water), antibacterial solutions, quaternary ammonium solutions, or 70% ethanol alcohol. One key way to kill the bacteria is to ensure that surfaces are thoroughly dried. The bacteria can also be inactivated by freezing temperatures (outside in the soil or water), by UV radiation, and by heat >131°F for at least 5 minutes.

So while you are waiting for that Lepto PCR result to come back from the lab, make sure you are disinfecting well and protecting yourself and your other patients!
